Restrictions on Permitted Development (Stanley) Direction 2016

S. R. & O. No: 11 of 2016

IN EXERCISE of my powers under paragraph 5 of the General Development Order 1991 (Title 55.3.1), I give the following Direction.

1. Title

This Direction may be cited as the Restrictions on Permitted Development (Stanley) Direction 2016.

2. Commencement

This Direction comes into force upon publication in the *Gazette*.

3. Requirement to obtain planning permission

The planning permission granted by paragraph 4 of the General Development Order does not apply to the developments on land of the descriptions set out in the Schedule to this Direction within the area of Stanley shown edged black on the attached plan.

Schedule

Developments of classes A and D of Part 1 of Schedule 2 of the General Development Order affecting:

- (1) All existing development with an internal area of less than 400 square metres, or
- (2) All plots of land occupied by a message or dwelling house which occupies 25% or more of its existing plot; or
- (3) All those parts or parcels of land known as:
 - (i) south end of garden at 9 Pioneer Row, Stanley, consisting of approximately 320 square metres of land;

(ii) north end of garden at 27 Fitzroy Road, Stanley, consisting of approximately 275 square metres;

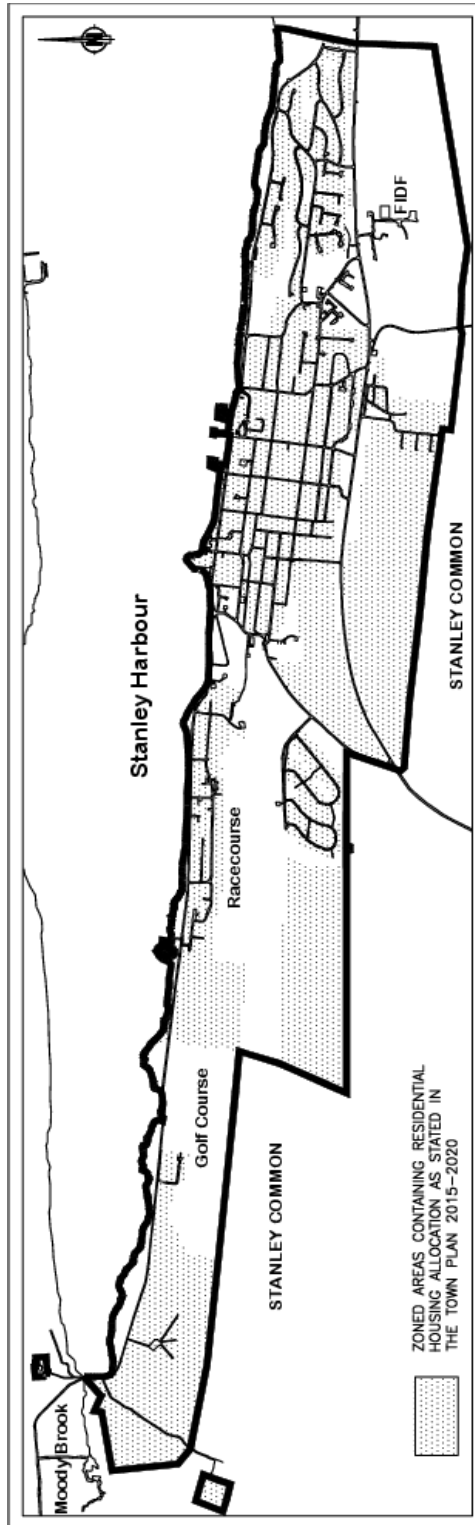
(iii) north end of garden at 10 Fitzroy Road, Stanley, consisting of 350 square metres of land;

(iv) 58 John Street, Stanley, consisting of 250 square metres of land;

(v) land to the east of Harbour View Knott, Eliza Cove Road, Stanley consisting of 295 square metres of land; and

(vi) north part of garden at 1 Felton Court, Stanley, comprising of 343 square metres.

EXPLANATORY NOTE
(not part of the direction)

The Governor of the Falkland Islands (being the appropriate planning authority within the meaning of Paragraph 4 of the General Development Order) acting on the recommendation of the Planning and Building Committee is satisfied that it is expedient that development of the descriptions set out in the Schedule to this Direction should not be carried out in the land in Stanley shown edged black on the attached plan unless planning permission is granted on an application made under the Planning Ordinance 1991.

The reason for this is to align the General Development Order with the Falkland Islands Development Plan (adopted August 2015) and to require residents of prescribed areas of Stanley to require planning permission before commencing ‘in fill’ developments.

It being impracticable to effect individual service on each affected owner and occupier the Planning Officer will publish this Direction on the Environmental Planning Department’s website and place a copy in the department for free public inspection during all reasonable hours.

EXPLANATORY NOTE
(not part of the regulations)

Section 35 of the Fishery Products Ordinance (No 21 of 2006) allows the Governor to designate vessels, establishments and installations of prescribed descriptions. Seven defined categories have been prescribed by the Fishery Products (Designation of Vessels, Establishments and Installations) Regulations (SR&O No. 9 of 2014):

- cold stores
- factory vessels
- fresh fishery products plant;
- freezer vessel;
- mechanically separated fishery products plant;
- processing plant;
- re-wrapping establishment

Based on this the Fishery Products (Designations) Order 2014 designates factory vessels and a cold store.

This order amends the 2014 Order to add to that list a processing plant.

It designates, under Schedule 4, the Falkland Islands Fish Company Limited as a processing plant.

(a) the denomination, fineness, weight, diameter, quality, shape, edge and number of the coins authorised by paragraph (1);

(b) the tolerance or remedy which may be permitted in respect of variations from the standard weight, diameter and fineness of the coins; and

(c) the design of the obverse and reverse of the coins.

4. Deemed denomination of Crown coins and their value as legal tender

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(not part of the order)

Section 9(1) of the Committees (Public Access) Ordinance (No. 10 of 2012) gives the Governor the power to designate statutory corporations as public bodies for purposes of the Ordinance.

The Ordinance gives members of the public rights of access to the meetings and documents of certain committees. These include boards or managing committees of public bodies.

This order designates the Falkland Islands Tourist Board and the Falklands Landholdings Corporation Ordinance as public bodies for purposes of the Ordinance. This means that members of the public have rights of access to meetings and documents of their boards or managing committees.



**SECOND REPORT TO THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY
FROM THE STATUTE LAW COMMISSIONER**

In accordance with section 5 of the Law Revision (Paving) Ordinance 2015

1. Introduction

Requirement for report

1.1 The Revised Laws (Paving) Ordinance requires the Statute Law Commissioner to lay before the Assembly regular reports about progress in complying with the duties imposed on the Commissioner by section 4 of the Ordinance.

1.2 The first report was laid before the Assembly on 24 March 2016.

1.3 Subsequent reports must be laid before the Assembly as soon as reasonably practical after the end of each subsequent period of 3 months. The Assembly's June meeting was cancelled. This second report will be laid before the Assembly at their July meeting to comply with the requirements of the Ordinance.

1.4 A copy of section 4 of the Ordinance, which sets out the duties to be reported on, together with a schedule of the dates on which subsequent reports are due to the Assembly, are set out in the Annex to this report.

Legislative Assembly powers on consideration of report

1.5 If the Legislative Assembly debates this report and makes recommendations, the Commissioner must give effect to those recommendations (reference section 5(4) of the Ordinance).

2. Summary

2.1 The duties which the Commissioner is required to report on can be distilled into two key tasks:

- (a) Preparing the Statute Law Database; and
- (b) Ensuring that it is accessible.

2.2 The project plans, which were largely approved by Executive Council in September 2015, identified three main work streams to meet the two key tasks above, against which progress is summarised:

2.3 ***Preparatory work:*** This stage has largely been successfully completed, but with two elements of work still requiring finalisation as detailed below.

2.4 ***Legislative text (what will we publish?):*** The last report noted that preparation of the full text of local laws is underway, although behind schedule due to resourcing difficulties. These delays have continued and have the potential to impact further on the overall delivery of the project.

2.5 ***Technology (how will we publish it?):*** The database design is scheduled to begin in August; this should occur providing the contract for the technical solution for publication is entered into by the end of July as currently scheduled.

2.6 ***Time for Completion:*** The Revised Laws (Paving Ordinance) provides that the Commissioner must aim to ensure that the Statute Law Database is complete no later than 31 March 2017. The Commissioner's last quarterly report to the Assembly forecast a delay of one month for completion (ie end of April 2017). There is the potential for continuing resourcing difficulties to impact overall delivery, but whether that will occur, and to what extent, cannot be determined until contract details for the technical solution are concluded. A further report will therefore be made on this aspect in September's report.

3. Preparatory work

There remains some ongoing preparatory work as follows:

3.1 Project planning

Executive Council has yet to agree the process for updating adopted United Kingdom laws after publication of the laws in 2017. Work on proposals for

this process is ongoing, and it is anticipated that a paper will be submitted to Executive Council in August.

The Legislative Assembly will be given the opportunity to debate the issues when proposals are put forward in due course as part of the Law Revision and Publication Bill (the Bill is not due for submission until the last quarter of 2016).

3.2 Procurement of technology solution

Procurement is nearing completion; negotiations with a preferred bidder are ongoing. It is anticipated that a contract may be signed by the end of July (which would be on-schedule with the revised high level project timeline agreed by Executive Council in March 2016). See also paragraph 5 about the technology solution.

4. Legislative text - What will we publish?

The work to prepare the legislative text for the database has been split into the following four areas:

4.1 List of Ordinances and secondary legislation

As reported in March, this list is complete, subject to final quality checks and the updating which will be required to reflect local laws made since the list was compiled. The list identified approximately 550 local statutes.

4.2 List of currently applicable UK Acts and secondary legislation

The list of UK Acts and secondary legislation currently applicable to the Falkland Islands has been split into the following two areas:

(a) statutes applied to the Falkland Islands by the United Kingdom authorities

A list has been produced in draft and is currently under consideration by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

It was anticipated that assistance might have been provided by the FCO in the process of identifying these statutes, but the FCO advised that they did not have the resources to carry out significant work on this. This means that more time than originally planned has been spent on this aspect of the work by the Law Commissioner.

This also means that consideration had to be given to how certainty could be provided about the accuracy of this list of statutes; given that HMG were unable to produce the information themselves. Initial indications have been given by FCO that a declaratory order could be made by the Privy Council to give some certainty to that list (which would be underpinned by some checking of the list by FCO within available

resources). Ministerial approval of that step is still required before it can be confirmed. Consultation with the Law Revision Expert Advisory Group has concluded that this solution would provide the best level of certainty available in the circumstances.

(b) statutes adopted by the Falkland Islands authorities

This list is significantly complete, as reported in March, but there is still some work to be carried out to finalise the list (no significant progress this quarter).

4.3 *Settled text of existing Ordinances and subsidiary legislation (ie revised text)*

This work has progressed considerably slower than scheduled, with legislative drafting resources being largely unavailable to the project until June (and with the Commissioner diverted by additional “law lists” and project management work).

Of 550 statutes, just under 150 have been settled to date (with quality control checks and consultation on revision yet to take place).

Part of this work involves identifying the various sources which will make up a consolidated statute; also making necessary revisions; and producing annotations about commencement of the consolidated statute and its amendments.

However, another part of the work involves drafting detailed instructions to assist the technology contractor in carrying out work to consolidate the laws. Because this work has proved more time consuming than anticipated, potential contractors were invited to explore to what extent they could work on the basis of original source documents to produce a consolidation, rather than relying on fresh instructions from us for consolidation. It was hoped that the contractor would have sufficient expertise in consolidation of laws for publication that they would be in a position to carry out this work themselves. Whilst contract negotiations are ongoing, if this aspect of the work can be undertaken by the contractor, it will mean that the work undertaken by us in preparing the laws for publication will be reduced. It may be therefore that at least some of the delays to this aspect of work can be made up.

This will be reported on to the Assembly in September, when the potential impacts of these matters on delivery of the project will be clearer.

4.4 *Recommendations for application or omission of UK Acts and secondary legislation not already listed*

This work was scheduled to begin in June, but has been delayed by the work described above (the Law Commissioner has to carry out this work herself, but has had no capacity to date). As indicated above, it is not known yet to what extent these further delays might impact on delivery of the project, because of

the potential to make up some time. The matter will also be reported on in September.

5. Technology - How will we publish it?

The procurement process for the technology solution for publication of the laws was carried out following consultation with the Law Revision Expert Advisory Committee.

The process which has been followed reflected the fact that whilst the project plans have clearly identified what solution needs to be delivered for publication of our laws, the plans do not include fixed ideas about exactly how the solution must be delivered. There are a number of ways of potentially delivering the same result.

The procurement proceeded first on the basis of an invitation for expressions of interest issued in March. In April, twenty one expressions of interest were received. Six entities were then invited to submit detailed proposals; and five proposals were received in late May.

A preferred bidder was selected by the tender board in June, and invited to negotiate. A representative of the preferred bidder visited the Islands in the week beginning 11 July. Negotiations are ongoing, so further details must remain confidential at this stage, but the procurement process to date does give some confidence in securing a solution which is fit for purpose reference the detailed project plans, and which is within the project budget.

- (1) The Statute Law Commissioner is responsible for the preparation of
 - (a) a database of the laws of the Falkland Islands; and
 - (b) draft legislation which enables the Legislative Assembly to approve the Statute Law Database as an authoritative statement of the laws of the Falkland Islands.
- (2) The Commissioner must aim to ensure that the Statute Law Database—
 - (a) is complete not later than 31 March 2017; and
 - (b) is as accessible to all residents of the Falkland Islands as is reasonably practicable.
- (3) In complying with subsection (2)(b) the Commissioner—
 - (a) must treat the internet as the primary means of access to the database, but
 - (b) must also have regard to the needs of those who have no access, or limited access, to the internet, or who prefer to access information in other ways.
- (4) The Commissioner’s primary objective is to ensure that the database serves the needs of residents of the Falkland Islands; but subject to that, the Commissioner must also have regard to the needs of others who may wish to access the database.
- (5) The Statute Law Database must contain—
 - (a) the complete and up to date text of all Ordinances of the Falkland Islands in force;
 - (b) the complete and up to date text of all subsidiary legislation, made under Ordinances of the Falkland Islands, in force; and
 - (c) a list of United Kingdom enactments having force in or in relation to the Falkland Islands.
- (6) For the purposes of subsection (1) the Commissioner may take as the authoritative text of an Ordinance or of subsidiary legislation any version produced in accordance with the Revised Edition of the Laws Ordinance that appears to the Commissioner to be accurate.”

BE IT ENACTED by the Legislature of the Falkland Islands —

PART 1 INTRODUCTION

1. Title

This Ordinance is the Livestock and Meat Products (Amendment) Ordinance 2016.

2. Commencement

This Ordinance comes into force on publication in the *Gazette*.

PART 2 AMENDMENT OF LIVESTOCK AND MEAT PRODUCTS ORDINANCE

3. Amendment of Livestock and Meat Products Ordinance

This Part amends the Livestock and Meat Products Ordinance (No. 14 of 2010).

4. Section 3 amended – Interpretation

Section 3(3) is amended by omitting the definition of “designated abattoir” and replacing it with the following —

““designated abattoir” means an abattoir designated by Notice for the purpose of producing and processing meat for placing on the market for human consumption and the Notice must specify the meat which the designated abattoir produces for placing on the market for human consumption;”.

PART 3 REVOCATION OF SAND BAY ABATTOIR (DESIGNATION) ORDER

5. Revocation of Sand Bay Abattoir (Designation) Order

The Sand Bay Abattoir (Designation) Order (S.R. & O. No. 27 of 2001) is revoked.

OBJECTS AND REASONS

This Bill amends the Livestock and Meat Products Ordinance and revokes the Sand Bay Abattoir (Designation) Order.

Part 1 provides for introductory matters.

Part 2 amends the Livestock and Meat Products Ordinance.

Clause 4 amends section 3(3) by replacing the definition of ‘designated abattoir’ to expand the definition to include details which must be included in the designation Notice

Part 3 revokes the Sand Bay Abattoir (Designation) Order (S.R. & O. No. 27 of 2001). Section 3 of the Abattoirs Ordinance provided for the designation of abattoirs by Order. The Governor made an Order to designate the Sand Bay Abattoir as a designated abattoir.

The Livestock and Meat Products Ordinance (LMPO) also provides for the designation of abattoirs by Notice. Since this is the legislation that deals with production of meat for human consumption and in particular for the export of meat to the EU and has specific requirements in regulations dealing with this the designation of Sand Bay Abattoir must be done under the LMPO.

In 2015 the LMPO repealed the Abattoirs Ordinance and made a specific provision saving any subsidiary legislation made under the Abattoirs Ordinance. Since all the necessary regulations required under the LMPO have been done there is no longer any need to save the Sand Bay Abattoir (Designation) Order and therefore *clause 5* provides for its revocation.

A Notice to designate the Sand Bay Abattoir will be made under the Livestock and Meat Products Ordinance which will be published at the same time with this amendment when it comes into force.

This Ordinance comes into force on publication.

3. Schedule 1 amended — Committees to which the rights of access to meetings and documents do not apply

Schedule 1 to the Committees (Public Access) Ordinance is amended by omitting paragraph (b) and replacing it as follows —

“(b) committees or sub-committees of Executive Council exclusively made up of some members of Executive Council to discharge an Executive Council function in accordance with section 57(3) of the Constitution;”.

OBJECTS AND REASONS

This Bill amends the Committees (Public Access) Ordinance (No. 10 of 2012) to provide that there are no rights of access to meetings and documents of a committee or sub-committee of Executive Council which is exclusively made up of some of the members of Executive Council specifically to discharge Executive Council functions under section 57(3) of the Constitution.

The current paragraph (b) of Schedule 1 to the Committees (Public Access) Ordinance provides that all committees of Executive Council are committees to which the rights of access to meetings and documents do not apply.
